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Hemmings Motor News Article

Tom and Gloria Kannas had a car mentioned in Hemmings Motor News in May. Below is the article about the car and information from Gloria (My father, Harlan Cratty, was a member of the Omaha Horseless Carriage Club and did many years of touring with that club in the Coupelet. I am sure a few of our current members would remember him. My son is Philip Berg contacted Hemmings about the car. He also is the one who has done the work on the car. He lives in California. The Coupelet is currently in our garage here in Treynor, IA)

The first car featured in Hemmings Motor News is still with the same family more than 60 years later By Daniel Strohl on May 26th, 2020

It's a common misconception that Hemmings Motor News for its first half-century or so only ran old-car classified ads and nothing else. That's certainly how Ernest Hemmings started the company in 1954. However, not long afterward, he started to feature readers' cars and, as it turns out, the first car he featured remains in the same family 60-plus years later. With our headquarters in Bennington, Vermont, still closed, we can't dig through our archives to confirm that Harlan C. Cratty's 1916 Ford Model T coupelet appeared as the first featured car in the October 1958 issue of Hemmings Motor News, but we kinda don't need to with the photos and information that Cratty's grandson, Phil Berg, recently sent our way. Those materials include a letter that Ernest Hemmings (then, as always, in Quincy, Illinois) wrote to Cratty (in Omaha, Nebraska) on September 30, 1958, in which Hemmings conducted some business with Cratty—the sale of a pair of camshafts for \$2—and then thanked Cratty for the photos of his T. "It is our aim to have a feature car each month and as your fine car is very usual (sic) thought it would be good to start out with," Hemmings wrote. He probably meant to write unusual.

It is understood the car was originally ordered by a doctor for use by his wife. But before the doctor took delivery of the car a rancher, who remained single all of his life, saw the car in the Ford garage and took a liking to it and ended up by driving it home. He used the car for his transportation until his death in the early 1950s. The car was purchased by the Gill Motor Company in Stuart, Nebraska at the ranch auction. Mr. Cratty purchased the car in December 1953 from the Gill Motor Co. It was in excellent condition and required only checking the oil, filling with gasoline, and putting air in the tires to ready it for the trip from Stuart to Omaha, a distance of approximately 225 miles. It covered the trip under its own power without mishap. All that Mr. Cratty has done is tighten the rods and main bearings. Also removing black paint from the brass trimming. Mr. Cratty is planning on restoring this car but have others in the restoration mill at the present time. But wherever the car is taken at the present time it always attracts plenty of comment and conversation due to the very unusual body style and excellent original condition.

Ernest then closed the story with a call for future Feature Car Of The Month submissions. According to Phil, his grandfather never did restore the coupelet. Instead, he drove it and a 1911 Model T touring that he owned in parades for the next several years before he decided the coupelet needed a new engine. Except "he wasn't the best mechanic," Phil said, so the rebuilt engine that went into the coupelet didn't run very well, leading Cratty to put the coupelet away in a North Omaha garage for the next 20 or so years. It fell to Phil's mother to retrieve the coupelet from that garage and then to persuade Phil to get it running again sometime around 2010.

The coupelet more or less as it appeared after decades of storage in Nebraska.

In the years since, Phil has rebuilt the coupelet's original engine and replaced only what he's had to, including the roof and interior, before more recently turning his attention to his grandfather's 1911 touring.
