Hemmings Motor News - The Nut Behind the Wheel: Leah Levin on Why a Senior in High School Drives a 1951 Packard 200 Deluxe

"I'd been looking for an old car since I was 10 years old. I think it started because my granddad had an early-'40s Ford truck. It was the coolest thing ever. We'd always go fishing down to the creek in it and it was good bonding time with my granddad. His dad owned a body shop, and the love of cars has been in the family since then.

"There's always been a huge car show in the town I live next to that I've always loved going to. They just don't make them cool like they used to. Cars today are just not like 'oh wow!' I like '50s cars and definitely '60, for so long I wanted a '67 Impala SS. Everyone tells me I was born in the wrong generation—it's definitely true.

"It probably started middle-schoolish when I started getting into my hobbies like music and movies and the things that make my life what it is. I loved listening to music from the 1940s to the 1970s and watching black and white movies. I got into that stuff and I still really am. Seeing all the movies that I loved and seeing all the things like cars and antiques and anything vintage. I have been collecting since middle school, so it's not just cars. Vinyl records are a huge thing for me. It's also hats, clocks, cameras...

"I was 16 last year and, well, now I needed an old car, and I got super lucky. We got the Packard in late September of last year. My dad knows a lot of people around. My dad's friend's friend was running an auction in Oklahoma. It was all-original with the straight-eight.

"Dad said, 'well this is your favorite color,' kind of joking, and it was the auction car in the best condition. I looked at it more and it was cute plus it was a bargain and a half. Even my grandparents were like 'Leah, you have to get this!'

"We made a trip out to pick it up. I was excited because we had always talked about getting one and fixing it up, but it had never actually happened. Once we got it home, we decided we needed to crack down on it and we actually got it running on the first or second day we had it. There was some old gas in it that really stunk up the place, but we were all excited saying 'yahoo, it's running!'

"That was great news to me: Already, it wasn't a fail. I could drive it to the golf course where I work, but that's only a mile away on gravel. But I live eight miles outside of town and high gear was not doing it, so we put it into the shop. One of my neighbors actually works on cars as a side job, but he's also a farmer and was busy with harvest, then he got busy with planting season. It was on the lift for a long time, so we decided to take over. I wanted to drive it real bad.

"Then last month we finally started getting it done. We put an LS engine in it, fixed all the wiring and now I can drive it to Omaha or Lincoln, which is like an hour from my house. Going on day trips with it is so fun. "Most of my friends are supportive like, 'oh yeah, this is definitely something Leah would do,' but I don't think they're like 'oh, I want a cool old car too!'

"I see older folks and they love it. All my high school teachers love it. It's my pride and joy."
