This Classic Blue Type II Volkswagen Bus is a Los Angeles Fire Survivor

The above photo of a retro blue VW bus that miraculously survived the deadly Los Angeles fires has been circulating around the internet with many viewers questioning the integrity of the photo. It's difficult to believe that the walls of flames which engulfed entire mountains and destroyed neighborhoods and the lives of thousands spared the classic VW van, but one news channel debunked any doubts with a closer look of what some have called a "magical bus."

In the photo, first shared by AP News, the VW bus, nicknamed "Azul", which is Spanish for "blue", retains its bright blue paint while its surroundings show just a glimpse of the devastation the fires caused.

Martin, who makes carbon fiber surfboards under Starlite brand, purchased the 1977 Volkswagen Type 2 on a whim while he was studying mechanical engineering at the University of California, Santa Barbara. He saved money on rent by living out of the van during his senior year, then, last summer, he sold the van to his business partner, Megan Krystle Weinraub. After a surfing trip with friends on January 5th, Weinraub, who is still learning to drive the manual transmission, parked the VW on a flat spot on top of the hill not far from her apartment near the Getty Villa.

Her learning curve could have been this VW's blessing in disguise. Fire erupted in the Palisades just two days later, forcing Weinraub to flee with her dog in her primary vehicle. While she felt bad about leaving Azul, that thought seemed minor when compared to the tragic loss of the community's homes and loved ones.

On Thursday, Weinraub received a photo from a neighbor with the bus in the background, bright blue against the otherwise dark path of destruction. "I freaked out," she said in an interview with AP. "I was in the bathroom, and I screamed."She immediately called Martin, who told AP "There is magic in that van. It makes


no sense why this happened. It should have been toasted, but here we are."

On her Instagram, Weinraub shared, "For two straight days, I was glued to the news, anxiously waiting to see if my house had burned down. It's something I never thought I'd experience. Seeing people I know lose everything was devastating. I feel incredibly fortunate and grateful to say that both my house and my bus are still standing. When I got a picture of the blue bus, surrounded by destruction, still standing strong, it took my breath away. Everything around it was gone, but Azul was still there. In that moment, it felt like a beacon of light, a symbol of hope that even in the darkest times, there is still light shining and good things are still possible."

Martin and Weinraub were even more shocked when they saw news outlets picking up the VW story. "It's so cool that it's become this, like, beacon of hope," Martin said. "Everything around it was toasted, just destroyed. And then here's this bright blue shiny van, sitting right_there."
