Seven Crucial Mistakes When Installing Weatherstripping

With over 60 years of experience, they've learned valuable lessons. To help others avoid common mistakes, they've compiled a "What Not to Do" list. Here are seven crucial mistakes to avoid when installing weatherstripping:

Throwing Away Originals

This is the most important piece of advice Steele can offer: Do NOT throw away the original weatherstripping parts until it's certain that replacements are available and fit correctly. It's easy to discard old parts, but once they're gone, recreating them becomes difficult. The new parts should always be compared to the originals, and a test fit should be done before discarding anything. If no suitable replacement exists, the original parts might still be the best option until a better one is found.

Not Prepping the Gluing Surface


Proper surface preparation is essential. While it may seem tedious to scrape off dried adhesive and rubber, a clean surface is key for a strong bond. Dirt, old adhesive, or debris will negatively affect the adhesive's ability to stick. The old materials should be removed, and the surface should be wiped down with an alcohol pad to ensure it is completely clean. This creates the best conditions for adhesion.

Skipping the Test Fit

Before gluing in the new weatherstrip, a test fit should always be done. This step ensures the new part lines up correctly before it's permanently attached. The weatherstrip should be held in place without gluing, using masking tape if necessary. For trunk or door weatherstripping, the door or trunk should be closed on the strip to ensure proper fit. Testing beforehand avoids the need to remove and reinstall the strip if issues arise later.

Not Double-Checking the Correct Orientation for the Seal

Some weatherstrips come in unusual shapes, making it hard to tell which side should face the gluing surface. Always double-check the orientation before installation. Steele provides instructions with their weatherstrips, and additional guidance is available on their website. If installed incorrectly, the weatherstrip won't seal properly and may funnel water into the vehicle instead of away from it.



Using Too Much Adhesive

More <u>adhesive</u> does not equate to a stronger bond. In fact, excessive adhesive can cause the weatherstrip to shift before it dries. A thin, even coat should be applied to both surfaces. One coat should be applied, left to dry until tacky, then a second coat should be applied before sticking the strip down. This method ensures a quicker drying time, and the adhesive will fully cure within 24 hours.




Shutting the Door or Trunk While the Adhesive is Still Wet

After all the work, it's tempting to shut the door or trunk immediately. However, the adhesive needs about 24 hours to fully cure. If the weatherstrip is disturbed before it sets, it could shift out of place, compromising the seal and allowing water in. The adhesive must be allowed to cure completely before using the doors or trunk.

Rushing Through the Job

Weatherstripping is often one of the final steps in a restoration project, and the urge to rush is strong. However, hurrying through this step can lead to bigger problems later. Time should be taken to do it right the first time. A properly installed weatherstrip will keep the vehicle dry and quiet for years to come.



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
